5	Allegory	A story that reflects a wider idea, such as a religion, philosophy or political idea.					
5	Myth	A traditional symbolic story that explores ideas about creation and nature. Myths have no known factual basis.					
7	Legend	An ancient story that is thought to have some basis in fact but many of the details are now exaggerated.					
3	Fables and Parable	A short story with a moral message. Fables include talking animals or objects.
