<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Henry VIII: character and aims; addressing Henry VII's legacy Government: Crown and Parliament, ministers, domestic policies including the establishment of Royal Supremacy Relationships with Scotland and other foreign powers; securing the succession Society: elites and commoners; regional issues and the social impact of religious upheaval; rebellion Economic development: trade, exploration, prosperity and depression Religion: renaissance ideas; reform of the Church; continuity and change by 1547 	<p>You won't get a specific question on any of the blue topics, but you will need to be aware of the impact of the below in the other topics:</p> <p>Society: Pilgrimage of Grace could be included in a question about religious changes and reforms of the Church.</p> <p>Economic Development: The impact of enclosure and its effects on Edward's reign.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Edward VI, Somerset and Northumberland; royal authority; problems of succession; relations with foreign powers The social impact of religious and economic changes under Edward VI; rebellion; intellectual developments; humanist and religious thought Mary I and her ministers; royal authority; problems of succession; relations with foreign powers The social impact of religious and economic changes under Mary I; rebellion; intellectual developments; humanist and religious thought Elizabeth I: character and aims; consolidation of power, including the Act of Settlement and relations with foreign powers The impact of economic, social and religious developments in the early years of Elizabeth's rule 	<p>You won't get a specific question on any of the blue topics, but you will need to be aware of the impact of the below in the other topics:</p> <p>Mid-Tudor Government/Royal Authority: This will have some impact on the social upheaval caused by religious and economic changes in Edward, Mary and Elizabeth's reign.</p> <p>Early Elizabeth: You won't be questioned on Elizabeth's early foreign policy – intervention in France and Scotland. However, this will have an impact on her later foreign policy which is included – especially important for knowledge of Mary Queen of Scots.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Elizabethan government: court, ministers and parliament; factional rivalries Foreign affairs: issues of succession; Mary, Queen of Scots; relations with Spain Society: continuity and change; problems in the regions; social discontent and rebellions Economic development: trade, exploration and colonisation; prosperity and depression Religious developments: change and continuity; the English renaissance and 'the Golden Age' of art, literature and music The last years of Elizabeth: the state of England politically, economically, religiously and socially by 1603 	<p>You won't get a specific question on any of the blue topics, but you will need to be aware of the impact of the below in the other topics:</p> <p>Elizabeth Government: This can have an impact on foreign policy, rebellions and economic policy.</p> <p>Religious Developments: An understanding of Elizabeth's attitudes towards Catholics enhances your understanding of foreign policy and the Northern Rebellion.</p>
